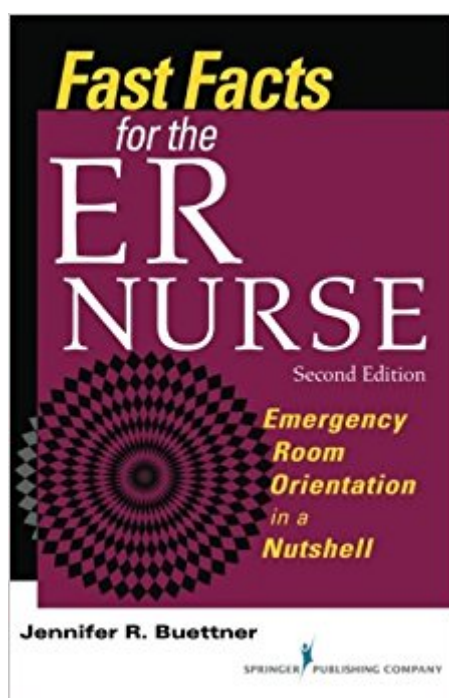


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Fast Facts For The ER Nurse: Emergency Room Orientation In A Nutshell, Second Edition
