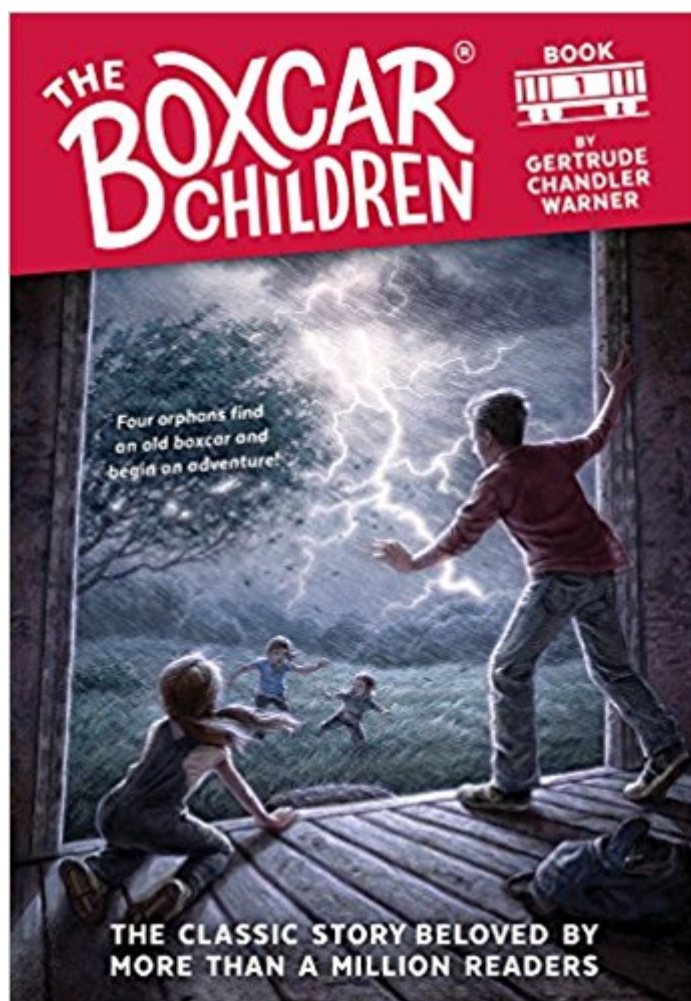

Children today should enjoy this tremendously as it really shows how innovative and independent children can be when given the chance (or necessity), and this book is clean & encouraging.
