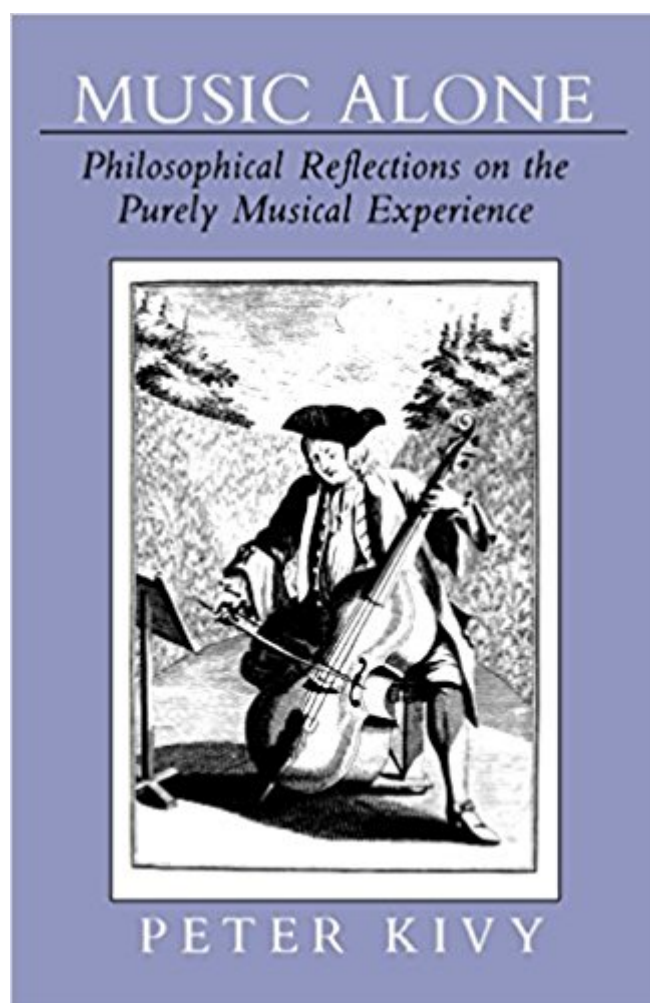


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# Music Alone: Philosophical Reflections On The Purely Musical Experience

I am surprised to be the first reviewer on this. I wanted to understand why certain music moves me so (Beethoven and Bach particularly). I wanted something beyond "program notes", and that means (I came to learn) musicology and especially philosophy of music. The search led me to some pretty turgid, academic, unreadable (to a non-academic like myself) texts, including books by this author, who is an academic. But this book is very good so far; I am about halfway through. The writing is accessible but deep, and explanatory without being reductionist. Reductionist would for example be "explaining" by employing neuroanatomy in a restatement of the problem as if that were an explanation, the way a physician will sometimes pronounce a diagnosis that is simply your symptoms restated in Latin. Kivy asks what it means to "understand" music, and I am finding his exploration of this to be very helpful to me.

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
