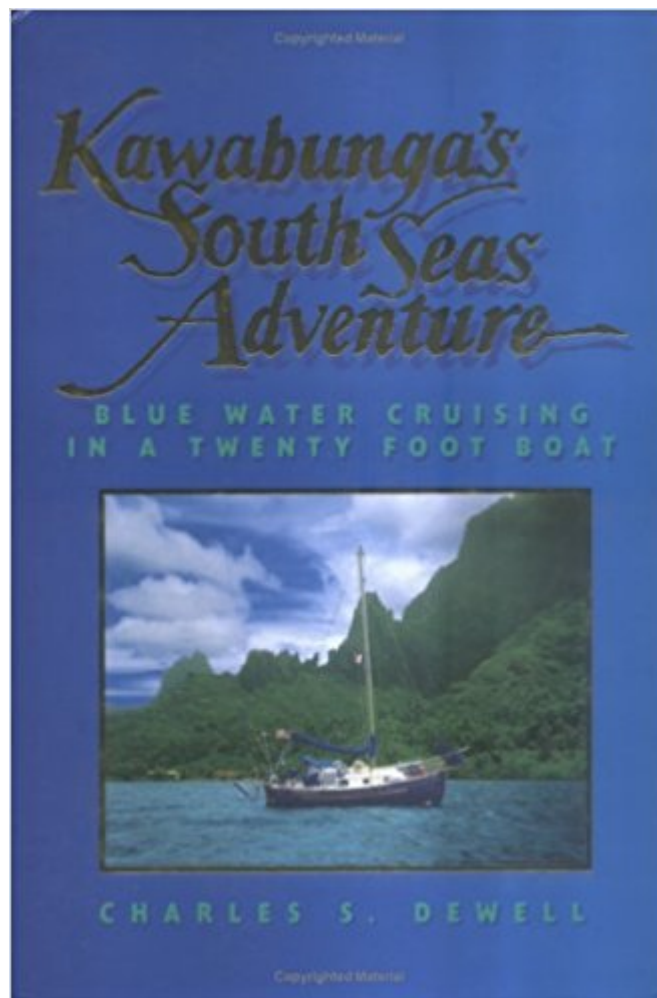




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# Kawabunga's South Seas Adventure: Blue Water Cruising In A Twenty Foot Boat (Microexplorer)
