While this book does an okay job of explaining how to make the simplest of bracelets, it is really a tutorial that could have been half the size for half the price. I felt ripped off by the price. Also, the front cover shows other bracelet designs, but the book is only for the simple 3 strand braid on the

inset of the cover where it says "make this bracelet".

This book provides just what you need to create saami bracelets. The instructions are concise and the photos are clear- walking you through the process. I also used the video links and found those helpful as well.

Not well done at all for a paper book. This book was printed from a website and includes paper pages that say, " click here for video" . Of course, you can't click for the video. There is very little text and it basically shows you how to braid and whip stitch. It is so NOTworth the money.
