

Weâ™ve seen this situation before: a parent neglects a child, while the child seeks a wider community to find support. Here that child is 12-year-old Addie, who lives with Mommers in a trailer on a busy street in Schenectady after her adored stepfather and half sisters move upstate. Mommers has lost custody of the âœlittlesâ • because of neglect, and though she and Addie can

laugh together, onceÂ Mommers hooks up with Pete, she is not much for good timesâ "though she brings the bad times home. Addie finds solace in occasional visits to her sisters and in her neighbors, especiallyÂ Soula, ill from her chemotherapy treatments. Connor takes a familiar plot and elevates it with smartly written characters and unexpected moments. Addie starts out being a kid who thinks she has to go along to get along, but as Mommersâ ™ actions become more egregious, her spine stiffens. And thoughÂ Addie loves her time upstate, she is willing to forgoÂ it when the normality she has there is more painful than positive.Â This is aÂ meaningful story that will touch many. Spoiler alert: The main character has a leaning disability, while her mother has an untreated bipolar disorder. All she wants is a normal life. She is befriended by non-blood "family", including a gay couple. I liked the casual acceptance of that relationship; it's part of the story but isn't an issue or problem. There's also a beloved friend with cancer, and a death, so it's not a light book, but it has very important ideas, and it's very readable.

I'm a shrink as well as an author and spent 40 years teaching middle school children. Not only am I impressed by the high quality of the writing, but with the wisdom of the content as well. Highly recommended for even high school students.

The author has given us a great protagonist--12 year old Addie, who is stuck between a rock and a hard place. How she perseveres and the love she gives and gets in return make this a moving and compelling story.

Great book. Sad but realistic with a good ending. I love reading from the child's perspective.

For a twelve year old girl, life with one possibly bi-polar parent is a lot to deal with. Add to the mix a deceased father, 2 half step sisters, a loving but distanced step father and Addie is barely coping. Thanks to an extended support system via the local gas station/convenience store, Addie is able to make it day to day, ultimately on her own, in her search for "Normal".

This is a great coming of age story. I have recommended it to many 6th and 7th grade girls and everybody loves it. It's a story that sticks with you...I've thought of Addie many times since I read the book a few years ago.
